Submitted herewith is the 1970 annual report of the Bellevue Police Department.

The 1970 calendar year has seen Bellevue assume the status of fourth largest city in the state.

From the police service standpoint this explosive growth presented us with our greatest challenge. In total dedication and enthusiasm, the men and women of the department rose to the occasion and accomplished what seemed to be an almost impossible task. Unequivocally, we have exceeded the expectations of newly annexed areas in terms of police services. Our achievements, however, could not have been possible without the supportive efforts of the City Manager and City Council in providing the fiscal resources which, historically, is known to be the greatest and most difficult obstacle that stands in the path of progress.

The format of this report differs substantially from that of previous years. Essentially, it will correspond with data we are now required to submit to the National Uniform Crime Reporting System. We will, however, continue to provide certain other information that maintains a reasonable continuity in documenting the Department's history.

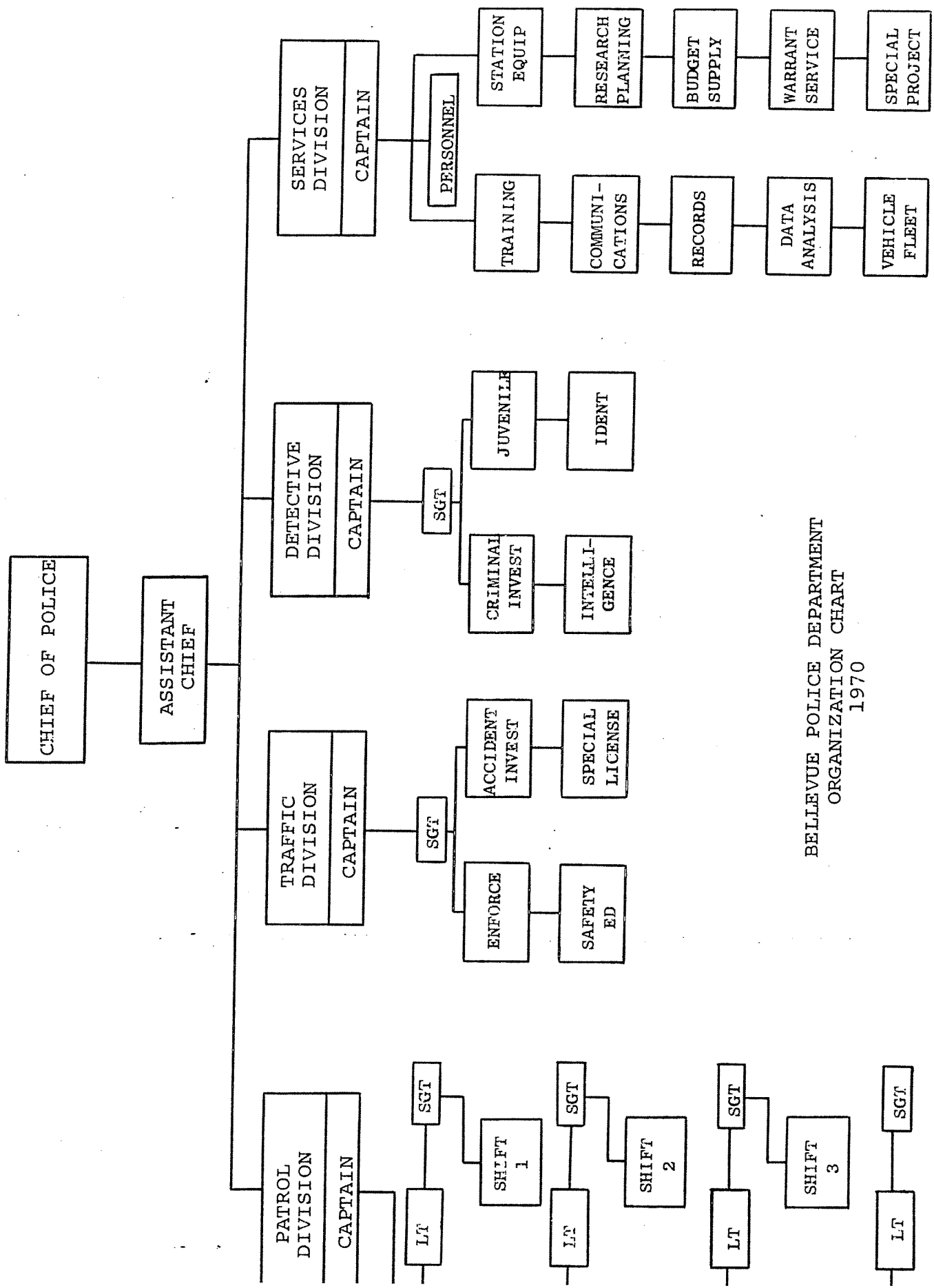

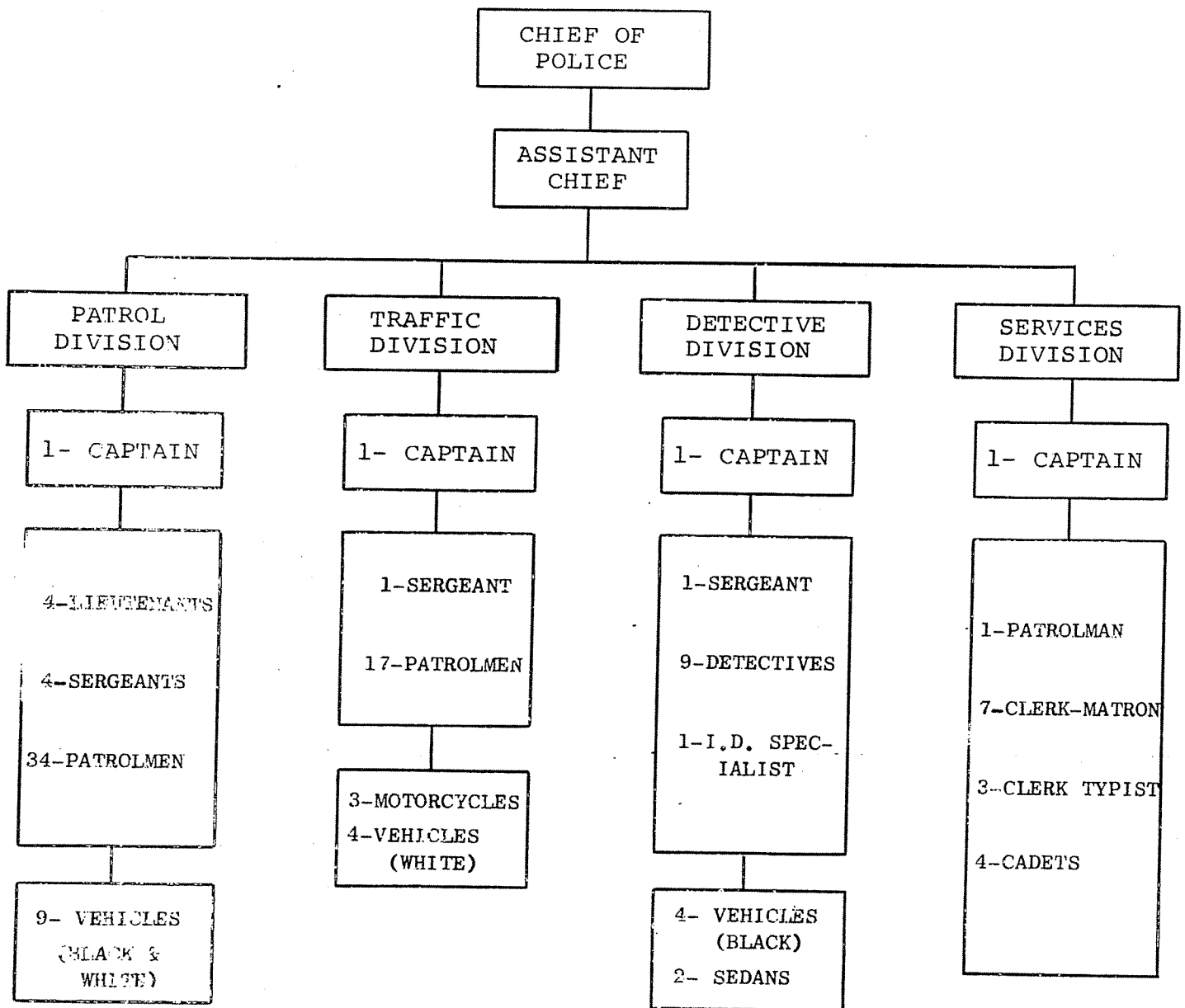

SALARY STRUCTURE - PERSONNEL STRENGTH

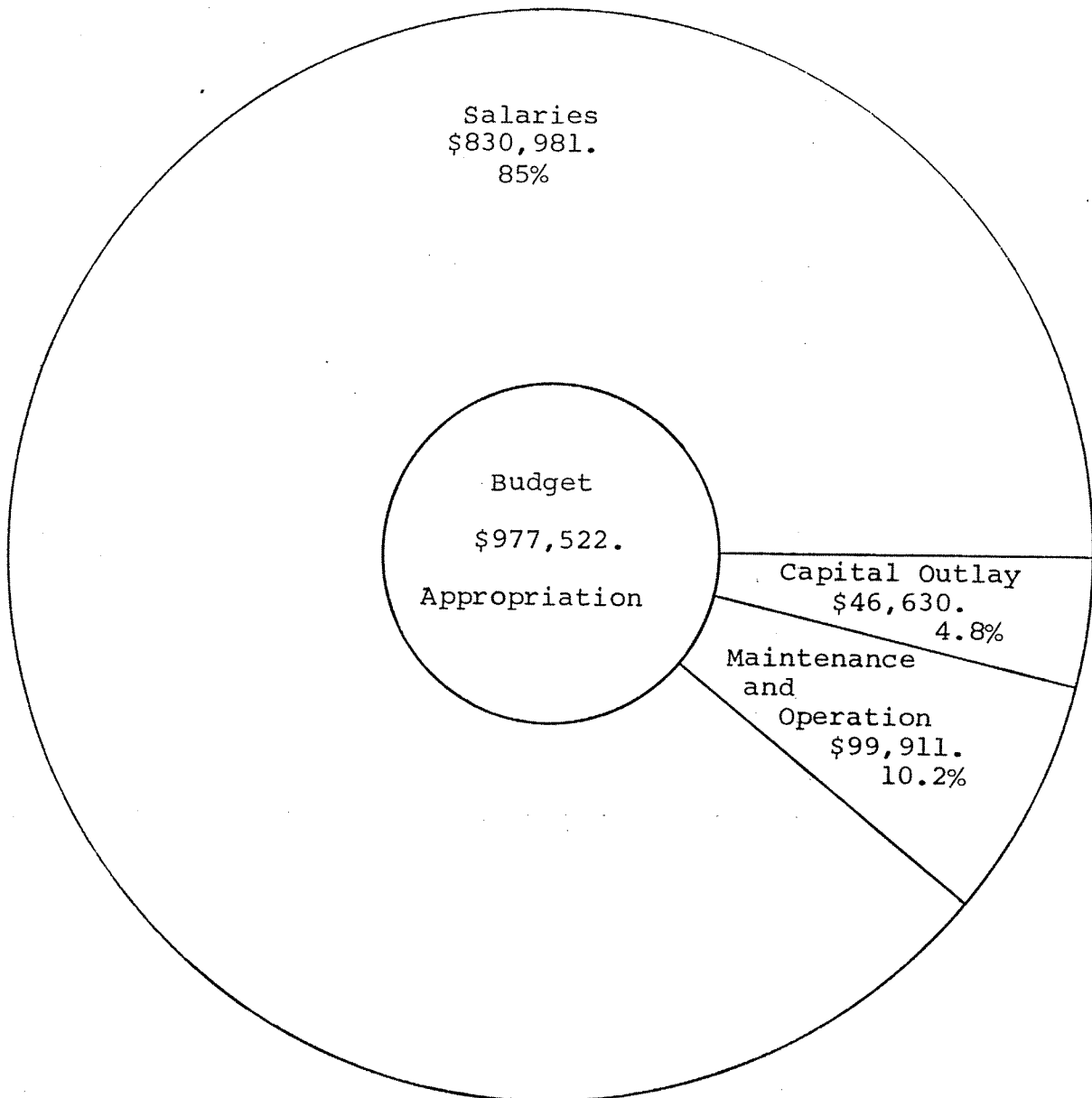

BUDGET APPROPRIATION

The 1970 budget appropriation for the Bellevue Police Department was \$977,522.00. This amounted to 8.5% of the total budget of \$11,457,051.00 appropriated for the City of Bellevue.

The Police Department budget appropriation set forth above was a per capita expenditure of \$15.77 for police services provided to an estimated 62,000 residents of the City of Bellevue.

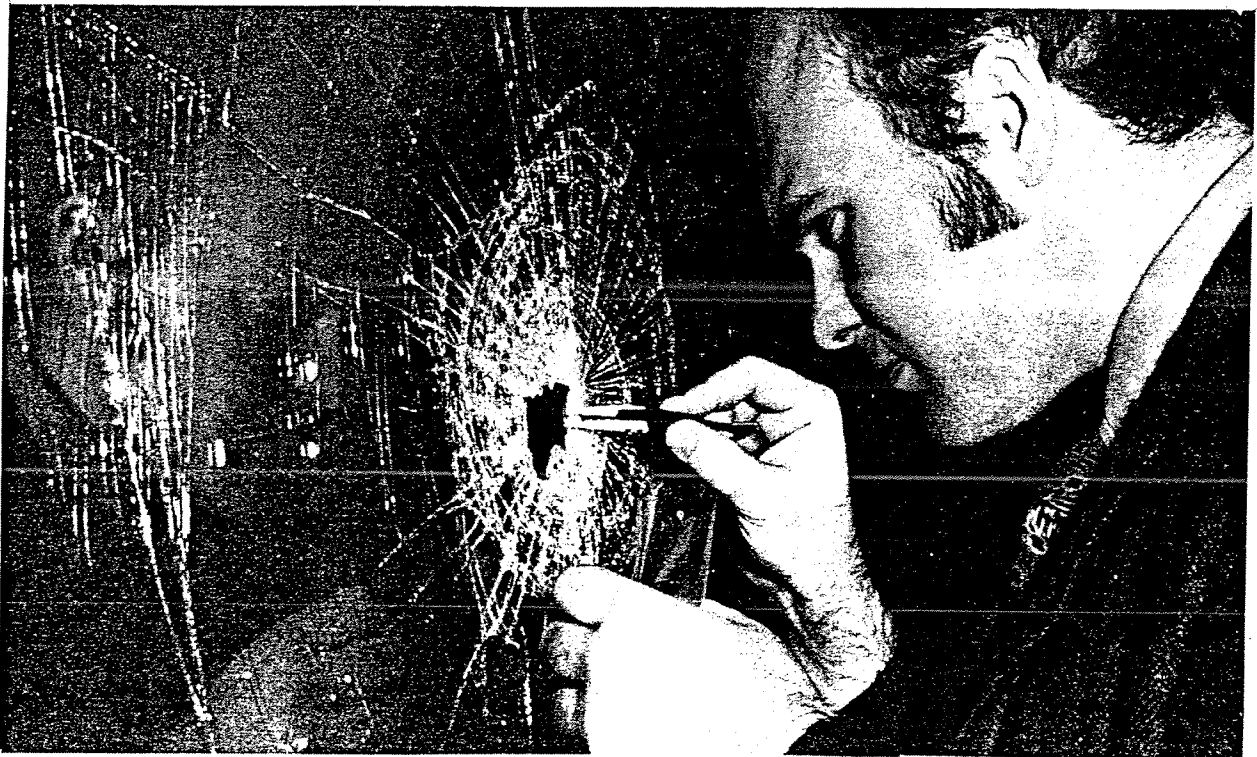

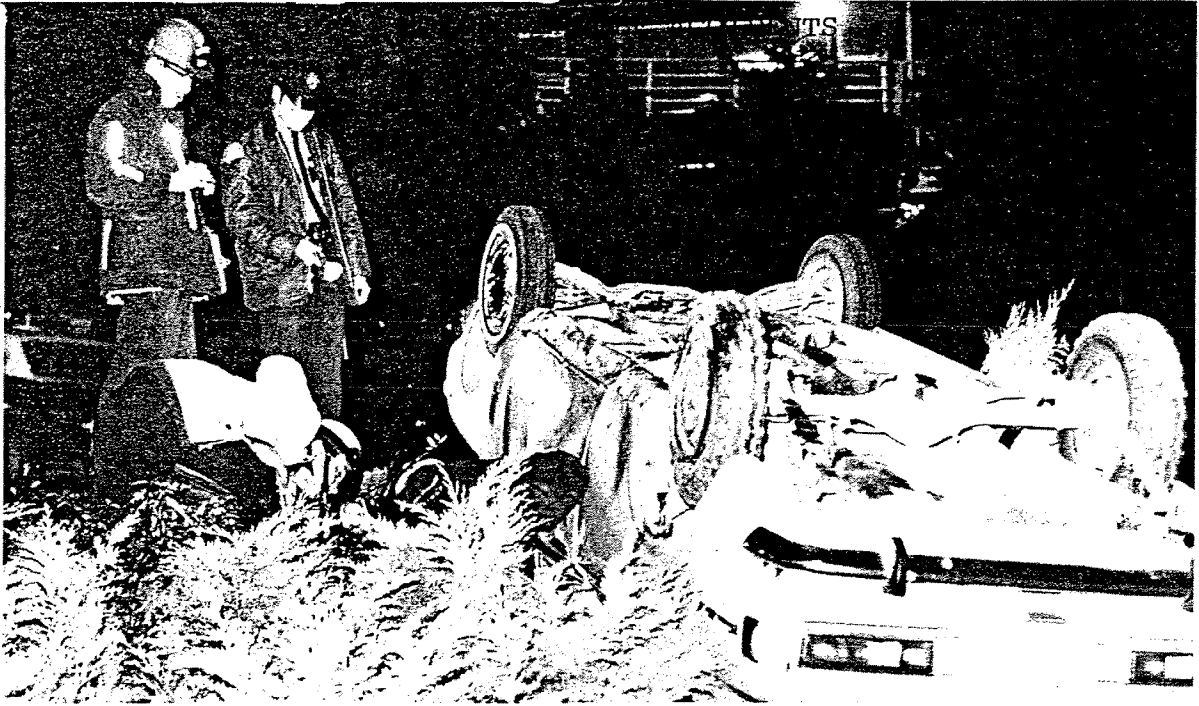

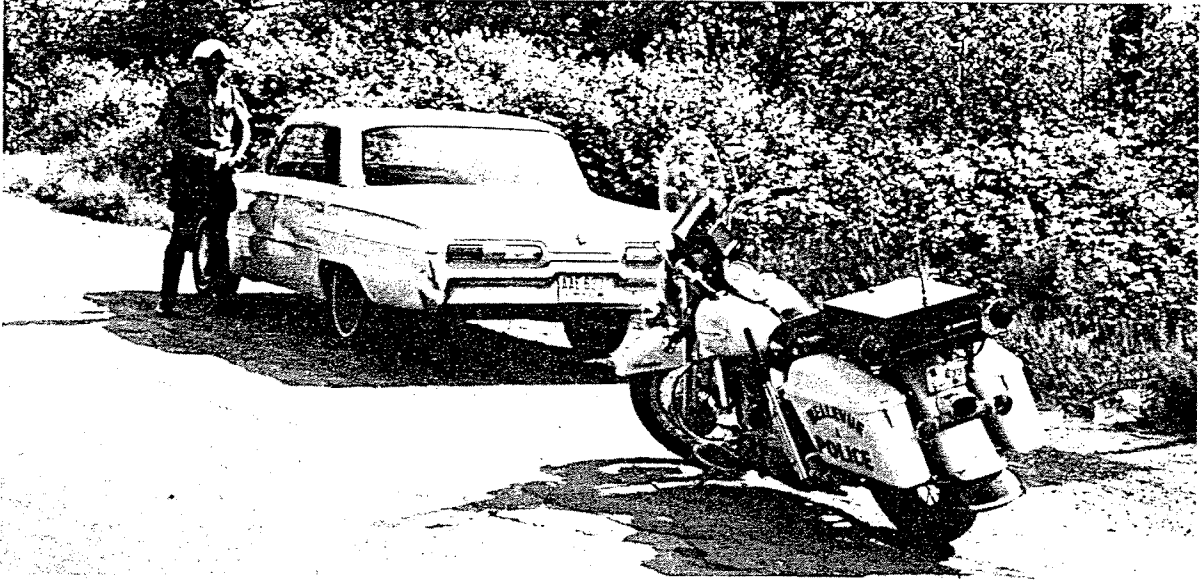
