

Traffic Analysis Report 2019-028 SE 28th Street between 165th Avenue SE and 169th Avenue SE



Thank you for contacting the City of Bellevue with your concerns about vehicle speeds on SE 28th Street.

After conducting a field review and speed and volume studies, we have compiled the data and our recommendations into this Traffic Analysis Report.

Please review the summary of findings and our recommendation on the next pages.



You specifically were concerned about vehicle speeds on SE 28th Street between 165th Avenue SE and 169th Avenue SE.

To address this concern, you suggested the following: Speed humps on SE 28th Street between 165th Avenue SE and 169th Avenue SE.

Our findings include:

- Based on the recorded speed and volumes on the street, we do not recommend moving forward with physical measures, such as speed humps.
- We recommend you utilize our yard signs or radar dolly to help encourage motorists to respect the speed limit. We encourage you to speak with your neighbors about the included education program recommendations. Summary of Findings

Below is a summary of the data we collected on SE 28th Street between 165th Avenue SE and 169th Avenue SE from 11/12/2019 to 11/18/2019



Road Characteristics

SE 28th Street is a residential street approximately 32 ft wide.



Residential Street


SE 28th Street is a low-volume residential street in the West Lake Sammamish neighborhood of Bellevue with a speed limit of 25 mph.



Daily Traffic

The mid-week daily average traffic on SE 28th Street is 95 cars per day. Mid-week average includes data between Tuesday and Thursday for both directions of travel.

FINDINGS: Our guidelines for physical measures apply to streets with average daily traffic volumes of at least 300 vehicles. As such, speed humps—as you requested—would be not be considered






Speed Study

When measuring vehicle speed, we use a metric called the 85th percentile speed. This speed, shown to the right, represents the speed at which 85% of all vehicles recorded are traveling at or below during our speed study.

FINDINGS: You requested the installation of speed humps on SE 28th Street. Physical measures such as speed humps are limited to streets where the majority (85%) of motorists are exceeding the posted speed limit by 10 mph. These guidelines were established based on the impact these measures have on emergency response.





Collision History

A three-year collision study was conducted on SE 28th Street between 165th Avenue SE and 169th Avenue SE.

FINDINGS: There were no reported collisions.

Summary of Recommendations

Below are our recommendations for SE 28th Street between 165th Avenue SE and 169th Avenue SE based on the field reviews, data collection, and analysis. More detail on these recommendations are outlined in the Residential Traffic Guidebook (*BellevueWA.gov/ResidentialTrafficGuidebook*). By educating the community and encouraging safe driving, we can begin to change driver behavior and reduce vehicle speeds.







Traffic Safety Yard Signs







This program involves lending communities portable signs that encourage motorists to respect the neighborhood, drive responsibly, and drive 25 mph. The signs are moved by community volunteers from place to place throughout the neighborhood every few days.



Radar Dolly





You can borrow and place a radar dolly on your street for up to two weeks. This unit gives motorists feedback on the speed at which they are driving on a digital reader board, encouraging them to obey the speed limit. Should you like to borrow the radar dolly, please request it by calling 425-452-6457 or sign up on *BellevueWA.gov/RadarDolly*. Once we receive a request, city staff will contact you to make arrangements for both the drop-off and pick-up of the radar dolly at your home.



Vision Zero



Bellevue's Vision Zero initiative reflects the city's commitment to reduce traffic deaths and serious injury

collisions on city streets to zero by the year 2030. In 2015, the city council passed a resolution providing a framework to achieve this goal. It states "the life, safety and health of residents, employees and visitors to Bellevue is the city council's highest priority."
