

NEP IS...

- Council-directed, City-Funded, Capital Improvements
 Program
- Provides RESIDENTS the opportunity to PROPOSE and SELECT enhancement projects for their individual neighborhood area
- \$5 Million BUDGET distributed among 14 designated neighborhood areas
- Area funds allocated based on the number of households in each Neighborhood Area
- Rotates through 14 Neighborhood areas over seven-year period – TWO AREAS per year (2015-2022)
- Program supported by multiple City departments –
 Community Development, Parks, Transportation, Utilities
- Currently 25 NEP projects in planning/progress around the city in nine neighborhood areas



NEP PROCESS


- City allocates \$\$ to Neighborhood Area
- Residents submit ideas for spending \$\$
- City staff review ideas & generate projects
- Residents select projects to receive \$\$
- City implements projects in 3-5 years



Neighborhood Enhancement Program coming to Newport area in January with \$282,000 for improvements

The Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP) is a \$5 million, city-funded, capital improvements program that allows residents to propose and

select projects that improve their neighborhood's quality of life and enhance its character. The program rotates through the city's 14 NEP neighborhood areas, serving two areas each year.

Since 2015, NEP has rotated through the Eastgate/Factoria, Cougar Mountain/ Lakemont, West



Lake Sammamish, Northeast Bellevue, Bridle Trails, Northwest Bellevue, Downtown/BelRed, Lake Hills, Crossroads, Wilburton, West Bellevue and Woodridge neighborhood areas. This month, the NEP process will be launching in the Newport area, which has been allocated \$282,000 for enhancements.

A virtual kickoff meeting will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 25, 6:30-8 p.m. City staff will provide attendees with a brief overview of the program guidelines and schedule, answer questions and invite you to share, discuss and submit project ideas. City project managers will be available in breakout rooms for specific project discussion. Following the kickoff meeting, each household in Newport will receive a postage-paid NEP Project Request Form in the mail. Residents are encouraged to use this form, or the online project request form on the NEP website, to submit as many NEP project requests as they like by March 3. BellevueWA.gov/nep

Police chief to provide update on use of force policy reform

Interim Chief of Police Wendell Shirley will host a wirtual community meeting to discuss the police department's progress in addressing recommended updates to its use of force policy. Following the murder of George Floyd by a now-former Minneapolis



police officer, Bellevue's mayor and city council pledged to have an independent review of the Bellevue Police Department's use of force policies to determine if any reforms were needed. The pledge included a commitment to review the police policies, solicit community input, and reform where necessary.

In September 2020, the City of Bellevue hired a consultant, the Office of independent Review Group (CliR), to conduct a comprehensive use of force policy review. In April, OIR issued its final report (BellevueWA.gow/sites/default/files/media/pdf_document/2021/Use-of-Force-Policy-Review-Final-OIR-Group.pdf), citing 47 recommendations. To date, the police department has addressed 32 of the recommendations. Eight more are expected to be adopted in early January.

"This review process has been invaluable to the police department. The feedback we received improves our policies and enables us to serve our community better," said Chief Shirley. "We are committed to ensuring our policies and practices serve all communities equally and equitably."

Chief Shirley will hold a community meeting to discuss the recommendations on Wednesday,

PROJECT CRITERIA

AFFORDABILTY

PROJECT COSTS MUST NOT EXCEED THE FUNDING ALLOCATION FOR THE NEIGHBORHOOD AREA

CONSISTENCY

PROJECTS MUST BE CONSISTENT WITH CITY PLANS AND POLICIES

FEASIBILITY

PROJECTS MUST BE PRACTICAL AND ACHIEVABLE FOR THE CITY

IMPLEMENTATION

PROJECTS MUST BE DESIGNED AND CONSTRUCTED WITHIN 3-5 YEARS OF SELECTION

MAINTAINABILITY

PROJECTS MUST NOT REQUIRE MAINTENANCE THAT IS BURDOMESONE TO THE CITY

PUBLIC BENEFIT

PROJECTS MUST BE LOCATED ON PUBLIC PROPERTY, EASEMENTS, OR PROPERTY DESIGNATED FOR PUBLIC USE, AND MUST BENEFIT THE GENERAL PUBLIC
