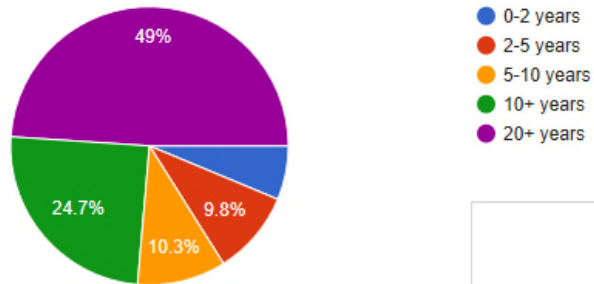

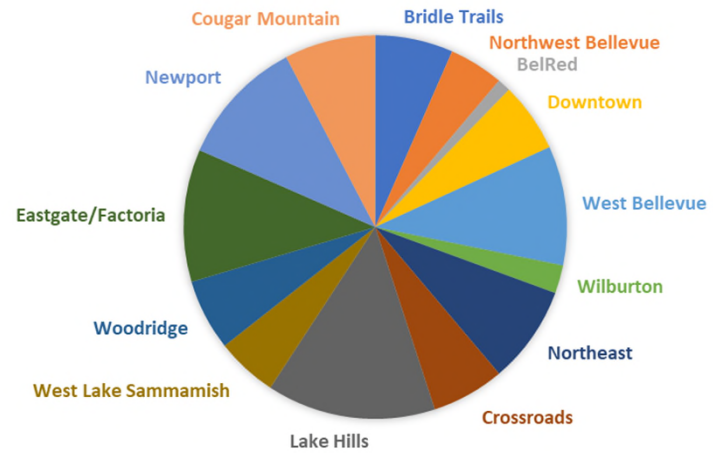


How long have you lived in Bellevue

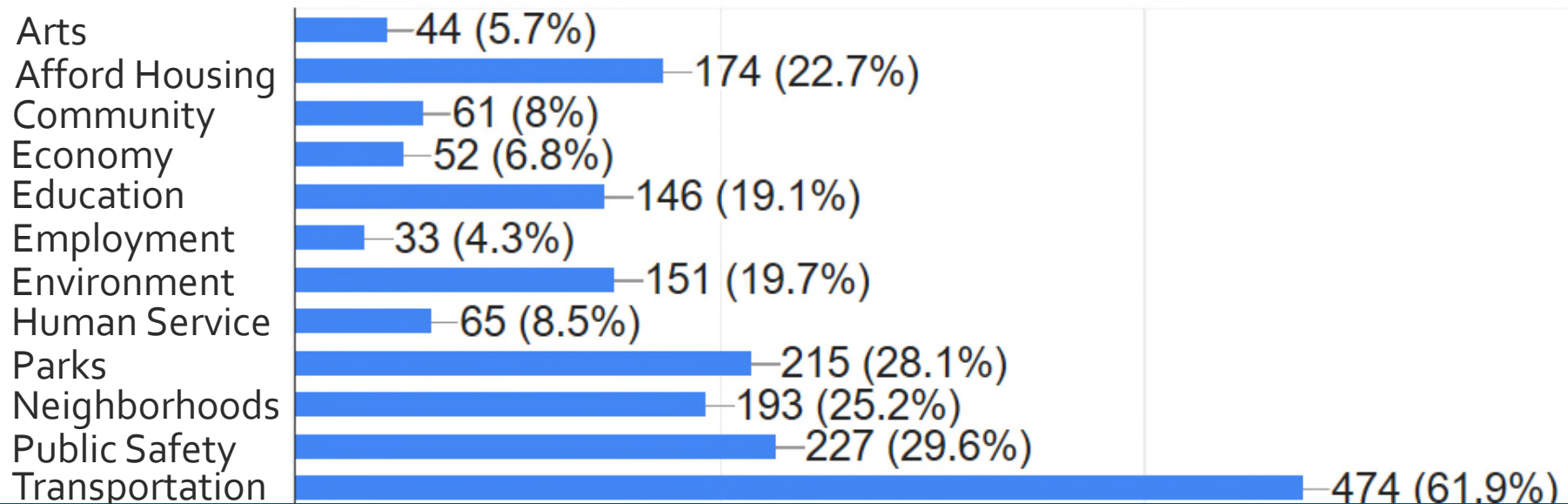
RESPONSE FROM NEIGHBORHOOD AREAS

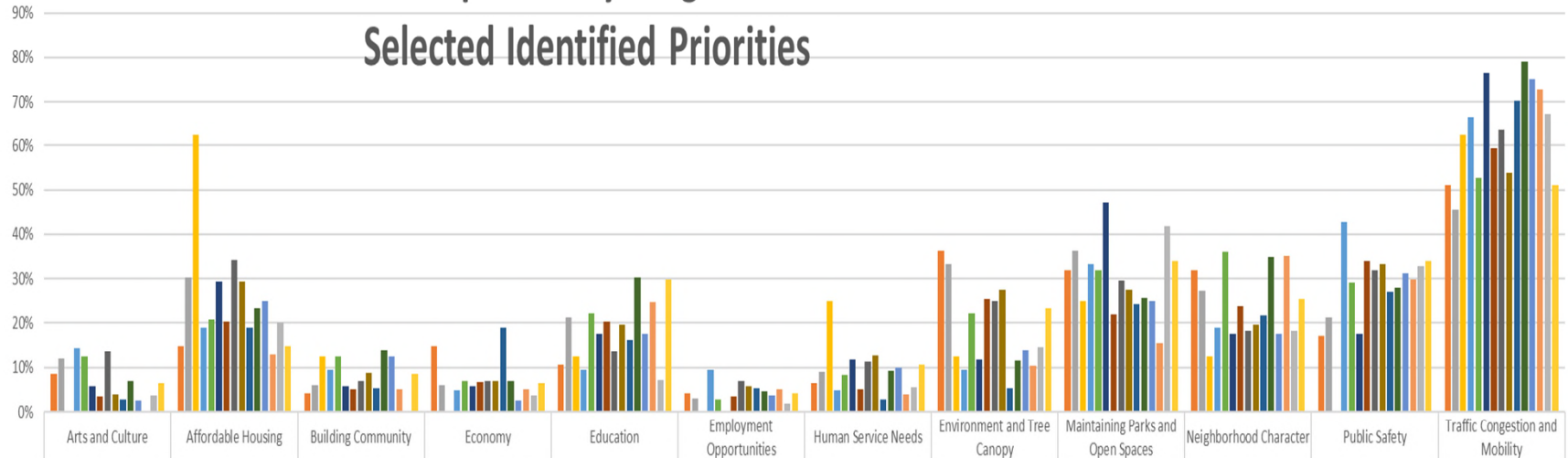

SOME ADVICE

Please find ways for people who are not rich to be able to live in Bellevue. We need service workers as well as senior vice presidents. Also, please do not allow more development unless the traffic increase is well accommodated.

If you have not done so already, spend time in the neighborhoods. Early morning, during commute times and later in the day when folks are heading home. Walk them, bring your team and include a member of the community. No doubt the needs/wants for each neighborhood are and will be different. That's what gives Bellevue character and diversity.

Too many people, with too few roads, and too few parking spaces. More "neighborhood" places, within walking distance. Small restaurants, wine bars, things like that. But mostly, look with a new eye to actual traffic and where roads and parking can be expanded.

SOME ADVICE

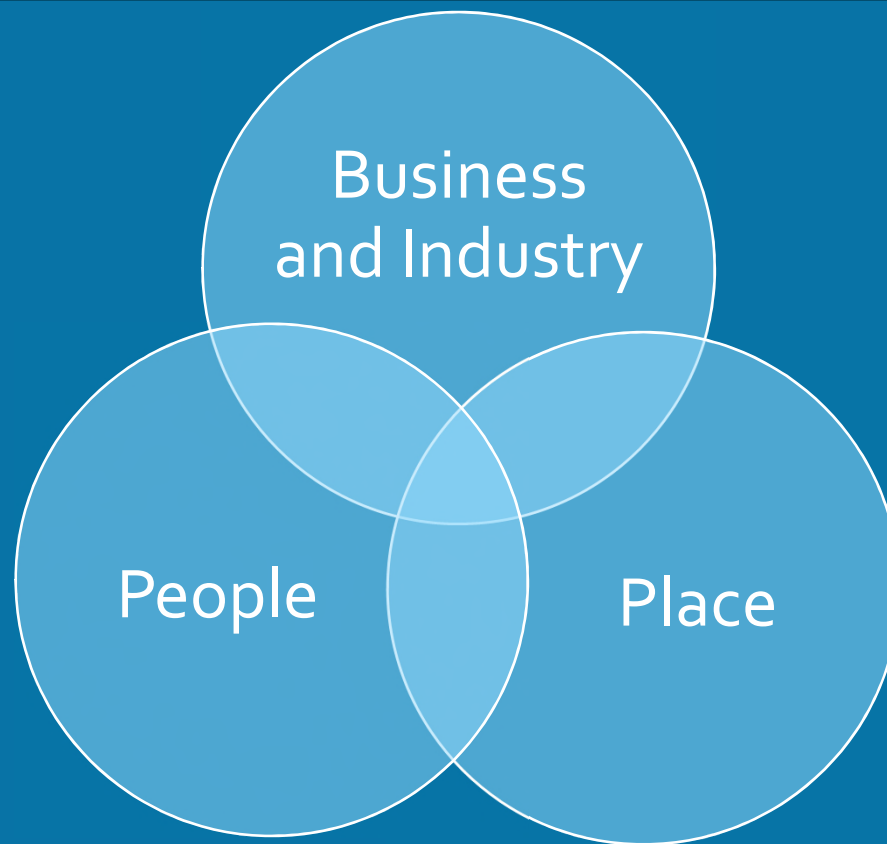
Transparency is critical - residents want information and most importantly they want to have input and their voices heard and considered.

We are seeing the gradual destruction of the "City in a Park" due to loss of tree canopy. We see major projects and construction destroying trees and degrading the environment. We can certainly do better!

Stop permitting large apartment buildings as we do not have the infrastructure to handle them. They are ruining the livability of the city with traffic congestion, not enough room at schools, and straining our public safety.

Quit talking at us and talk with us about keeping our neighborhoods safe, functional and vibrant, before we end up like Seattle.

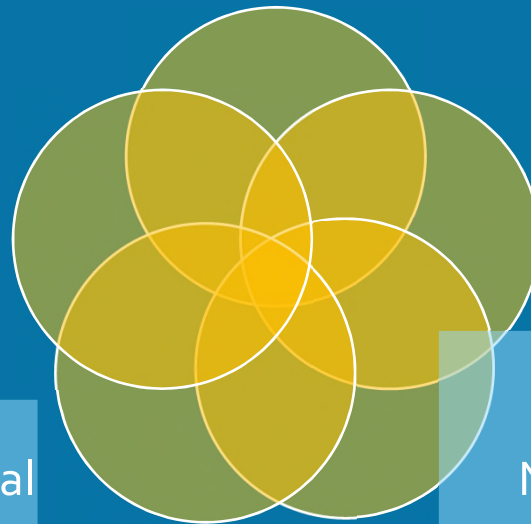

With so many on-line news sources and social media tools, how do we acquire skills that help identify what is reliable information and what is disinformation?

Assistant Professor, Kate Starbird, University of Washington Department of Human Centered Design and Engineering will discuss how the emergence of "fake news" and conspiracy theories can reshape our understanding of national and local events. This is a complex problem at the intersection of technology, human thinking and social behavior. The abundance of new channels for information make us increasingly vulnerable to absorbing and spreading misinformation.

Join us as Starbird shares what she has learned about how online rumors spread—and how online rumors are corrected—during natural disasters and man-made crisis events. She will also share what disinformation and conspiracy theories during crisis events reveal about "fake news".

The forum is free and open to the public, recommended for age 13+. No childcare available.
